SELECT A SITE

1. Find a historic site. It may be as close as a neighborhood street corner, a Worcester landmark, or any other site across this great state.

VISIT THE SITE

Plan a day/time to visit the site you have selected. Most likely you'll need to include family on this venture for transportation purposes, so allow them a say in the site selection!

Research the site before you go. Learn all you can about it so you'll be prepared and know what to expect. When you are there, read any promotional material or plaques.

Take notes when you are there. Either have a notepad or use your phone. Record facts and details you learned. Also, jot down your thoughts, impressions, reflections.

Take some photographs of the site, and **be sure to include a picture of YOU at the site**!

WRITE ABOUT IT

Write a 2 paragraph review of the site and your experience. Ideally, create a Google Doc in your school drive. This is **due at the first class**, when I will ask you to upload it to our Google Classroom.

Paragraph # 1 - Introduce the site and include: These are not required questions but rather prompts you may consider for your response.

- The name, date, and location of the site you visited
- Who you were with
- Describe the building (what does the monument, marker, etc. look like?)
- Explain what historical event is being commemorated.
- Include when it took place and why it is significant.

Paragraph # 2 - Write about your impressions and reflections:

- Was the site what you expected?
- How/why was it different?
- What surprised or confused you?
- Is the person or event worthy of commemoration?
- Would you recommend it to other students? (why or why not)
- How did you feel about having to do this assignment?
- Include the photo you took of you at the site.

Edit, revise and proofread!

- Use formal language.
- Write as if you are reviewing the site for a publication.
- Check spelling, grammar and mechanics.

Be prepared to share your experience.

- In the first few classes you will be asked to share your experience.
- You are not expected to read your response aloud.
- Summarize the ideas you wrote about in your own words.
- Focus on your overall experience.
